

Pieris japonica, sometimes called Andromeda or Lily-of-the-Valley Shrub, is an evergreen shrub related to rhododendrons and heather. It bears small, mildly fragrant, white or pink urn-shaped flowers in showy racemes (sprays) that give the shrub its common name. It provides year-round garden interest, making it a great shrub to anchor a bed or place near an entryway or patio. Smaller varieties do well in large containers. Pieris has glossy evergreen foliage, with most varieties sporting new growth in late winter in bright shades of burgundy, bronze, red, or chartreuse. Sprays of bead-like flower buds (usually pink, red, or green) form in late summer and ornament the plant throughout the winter. Then the flower sprays open in late winter to early spring, providing visual interest and food for orchard mason bees and hummingbirds at a time when few other plants are in bloom.

Pieris does very nicely in Puget Sound gardens in full sun to partial shade. It does not like hot afternoon sun. Most varieties grow as mid-size shrubs, typically growing to about five feet high and wide in a decade. Pieris likes soil rich in organic matter. Feed in the spring with a good rhododendron fertilizer such as Dr. Earth Rhododendron & Camellia Food or E.B. Stone Azalea, Camellia & Gardenia Food, and keep watered during our summer droughts. Like rhododendrons, pieris are shallow rooted. They resent being planted too deeply or mulched heavily. Pests are rarely a problem; rhododendron root weevils can be controlled with beneficial nematodes if necessary.

A number of pieris varieties have been awarded the (British) Royal Horticultural Society's Award of Garden Merit, or have been selected as Pacific Northwest Great Plant Picks. These varieties tend to have a particularly fine show of flowers and/or new foliage, and to perform especially well in maritime garden conditions. In the table below, these varieties will have RHS and/or GPP after their name.
